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





I came to you ten and a half years ago at a time of both deep sorrow and financial challenge in our parish. The passing of the beloved pastor, and the embezzlement of the church funds almost destroyed the peaceful life of our church community. And I prayed to God day and night to grant me His Heavenly Wisdom and for strength to bring comfort and stability back to my new church and our new home. As many of you reminded me over and over: I had big shoes to fill. Today, after ten and a half years, looking into your faces, I can humbly say that I have striven to fill those shoes and even to enlarge them. Being a priest (especially in the Armenian Church of the Diaspora) is a serious Calling. My main goal in this community was to be in the breach, standing between the flock and whatever would seek to prey on them. My position was to be where Christ placed Himself. I have done the best that I could and was able to do. I woke up each new day glorifying God and trying to become a better priest and a worthy servant of God, so that I might lead you all to where Christ would have us to go and to be. I have tried to bridge you with our Savior. Well, sometimes I was called "a sad priest", because I did not tell enough jokes in the church.

Sometimes I received nasty letters and hate-emails, but I took them as a personal blessing, because those who made problems for me and for us (willingly and unwillingly, knowingly and knowingly), left a great treasure with me: a life experience and great patience, which will help me in my future ministry serving God. Sometimes people complained about my sermons which actually gave me great confidence that they got the message and the truth of God caused them to think more carefully about themselves. As the Anglican bishop Thomas Nicolas says: "People often get upset when you teach them what is in the Bible rather than what they presume is in the Bible." And today, I want to confess that I am the happiest priest in the entire Western Diocese, because I preached from the pulpit of our church not what people wanted to hear but what they needed to hear. Thank you for helping me to be honest in preaching the truth of God and serving you according to God's Will. Your faithfulness and your great faith have been a gift to me in all the trials and tribulations we have endured together.

My beloved brothers and sisters, I came to you ten and a half years ago with many interests, and you have encouraged me and conceded the time I have spent away from the parish: from my education in Berkeley for my master's degree in theology to participation in many board and committee meetings; from pilgrimages to Motherland Armenia and to the Holy Land to participation in local and outside organization's events. From our own Diocesan programs to local ecumenical and interfaith gatherings with other church leaders. I hope that these other ministries outside of our church have made me a better priest. Thank you for supporting these opportunities. Your encouragement has been a true gift to me.

I came to you ten and a half years ago as a young priest, a minister of the Holy Sacraments, and you have opened the doors of your hearts and your homes in





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front of me as I have baptized young and old; as I have celebrated God's forgiveness and healing strength; as I have witnessed the union of Holy Matrimony; as together we celebrated Soorp Badarak (Divine Liturgy) and received the precious Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ every Sunday; and yet sadly, as we have also presided over many funerals, as we have buried our beloved church and family members. You have welcomed me into your homes so that I may perform Home Blessing services; I have visited you in the hospitals, convalescent and nursing homes, and even in jail. I have welcomed you into my office, into the sanctuary, at Starbucks, on the streets, in restaurants and parks, at special events, engagements, weddings and baptism celebrations, birthdays and graduation parties, and at the end, at Hokejash. For any priest, this is the greatest gift: to be able to share your lives in times of both joy and sorrow as a reminder of the presence of Christ our Lord Who is always among us. To be sure, I reached out to my faithful people and shared the love and the word of God with them and comforted them with the graces of the Holy Spirit. To be sure, I have done whatever my Lord commanded us to follow in the Gospel according to St. Matthew: "For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you took me in; I was naked and you clothed me; I was sick and you visited me; I was in prison and you came to Me... Amen! I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me" (Matt. 25:35-36;40). Thank you for this sacramental ministry: being able to walk the Christian journey with you has been a gift and a true blessing to me.

I have tried to be a loving and caring priest for each and every Armenian living in the East Bay, and I have tried to do my best to make our East Bay Armenian Community more united and stronger. We ought to be proud of our Armenian heritage and identity, keep our Christian faith, our God-given language, our ancient culture, and love one another. In all our differences (political, cultural, etc.) always remember that Armenian identity comes first, that we are the children of the same nation, God's chosen nation, God's own nation. The Armenian nation has gone through many trials, faced genocide and communism, lost the majority of its motherland, but won the battle of Sardarapat and liberated our beautiful Artsakh. We Armenians, we have to be together and we have to stay united especially in the Diaspora. Because when we are together, we are strong. Do not choose to leave your Armenian Church and community because you do not understand or speak the Armenian language. Do not leave, but stay, and keep your Armenian soul and spirit, "hoki yev voki", strong and alive, the spirit of St. Vartan, St. Mesrop Mashtots, the heroes of the battles of Avarayr and Sardarapat, the spirit of Khrimian Hayrik and Garegin Hovsepiants, the spirit of the Armenian soldiers protecting the borders of our small and beautiful Motherland Armenia. With that spirit, our forefathers came to this country and built our churches and schools, because they knew that without that spirit our nation would be lost a long time ago. Keep your Armenian spirit and our nation will have a bright future.

More than anything, know that you have been a blessing to me and my family during these ten and a half years, as I am confident you will be for your next pastor as well. I encourage you, brothers and sisters, to continue to open your hearts in love, to persevere in prayer, to serve the needy ones, and to let the peace of Christ dwell in your hearts. As it is written through the Prophet Isaiah (60:2): "Darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the Lord shines." Keep on being the light that you have been for me, and the world will know that God dwells among us. And I pray that you might use that gift to become the light of Christ in the world. To be that light, we must become holy – as the Lord says in the Scripture: "Be holy because I am holy" (1 Peter 1:16). Holiness must be the goal of our lives as followers of Christ: it means being whole in everything we are, so that there is no division between what we say and what we do; so that the faith we profess is put into action through the lives we lead; so that the love we have received from God is returned in the love we show to both God and neighbor. This, then, is my final charge to you: Be holy, just as the Lord our God is holy.

Be holy in the way you show hospitality, when you welcome fellow human beings as you welcome Christ, when you show as much love to strangers as you do to friends; for in doing so, some have unknowingly entertained angels (Hebrews 13:2, citing Genesis 18). So be holy in showing hospitality.

Be holy through your life of prayer, seek out times of silence when the noises of this world can give way to the tiny whispering sound that is the voice of God. For it is in silence that we can hear the plans God has in store for us. Be holy in prayer and silence. (1 Kings 19:11-12 and Psalm 46:10a)

Be holy in the way you proclaim God's Word, whether it is convenient or inconvenient. Learn the truth through Scripture and the Church, and lovingly share that truth with everyone you encounter. Because the love of God, and the truth of the Gospel, is not just for us – it is for the whole world. But who can call on the Name of the Lord unless they believe; and who can believe unless they have heard; and who can hear unless there is someone to preach? So, you must proclaim the Gospel yourselves, in words and in actions.

Be holy, brothers and sisters, in the way you live, so that every action is done with love, a selfless love, a Godlike love, which strives to make others happy, which puts the needs of others before your own, which replaces

pride with humility and envy with generosity. Let your love be sincere; abhor what is evil, hold on to what is good (1 Thessalonians 5:21). Love one another with the love of Christ, always being ready to sacrifice yourselves for each other. Anticipate one another in showing honor and respect. Remember what I said to you over and over: God entrusted His Divine Image to each one of us. When we honor each other we honor the Image of God. If possible, live at peace with all. Our world today is often filled with hatred and fear, with self-centeredness and isolation. But faith and fear cannot occupy the same space. And, in the end, love always wins. "If I have the gift of prophesy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:2). Love should be the answer to all the questions and misunderstandings, to all the concerns, worries, and struggles. Love should be the foundation of our faith in serving God. Be holy in showing love to one another.

Be holy in your celebration of the sacraments, especially the Holy Badarak. "For I have continued to hand on to you what I have received, that on the night before He died, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and said: "This is my body." In the same way, He took the chalice and said: "This is my blood; Do this in remembrance of me." As often as you receive the Body and Blood of Christ, Holy Communion, you proclaim the death of the Lord until He comes" (First Corinthians 11:23-29). There is nothing we do as a community of faith that is more important than the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, Soorp Badarak. Please, never be late, Christ is waiting for you every Sunday to share His heavenly joy and His Great Banquet with you. If you continue to make the Eucharist the center of your lives as individuals and as a parish, then the love of God will transform this community in wondrous ways which we cannot imagine. Be holy in your celebration of the sacraments.

Finally, brothers and sisters, be holy in welcoming your new pastor. Whoever he may be, he will continue the work of the Lord, just as I hope that I have done here. Please, do not compare your new pastor with the former pastor, and never look for the old one in your new priest. Christ says in the Gospel of St. Mark: "No one pours new wine into old wineskins. Otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins" (Mark 2:22). Open your hearts to him and his family as you have opened them to me and my family; love him, as you have loved me; nurture him, as you have nurtured me; and pray for us both, that the Name of the Lord may be glorified in our lives and in our ministry.


## "While I am leaving you, there is One who remains constant: Jesus Christ."—Fr. Hovel

Neither priests nor these beautiful buildings are the church, but you and your assembly in the Name of the Lord are the True Church."

May the God of peace Himself make you perfectly holy, and may you entirely be preserved blameless for the Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, that the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, may keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:7).



## The Meaning of Lent

The principles and practices of Lent in the Armenian Church are deeply rooted in the Bible, the ancient Christian traditions, the life-example of Christ and His disciples, and the lives of the great church fathers, all of whom contributed to the establishment of the canons of Lent. The focus of Lent is on "Man the Sinner": on his repentance, his spiritual cleansing, and his eventual salvation.

Here are two biblical passages that elaborate the deeper meaning of Lent: "Even now, declares the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning. Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God." (Joel 2:12-13)

"When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners, to be seen of men. Verily I say unto you, they have received their reward in full. But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:5-6)

Lent is a very personal spiritual journey. It is a period of sincerity, self-recognition, and reflection. Abstinence, moderation, and sacrifice free us for meditation and the realization of the darkness of our world without God. As the prophet Joel advised us, you must "turn towards the Lord...with all your heart," with honesty and humility. In this way, we are able to create a bridge between God and us. Through prayer, we communicate with God, express our love, ask for forgiveness. Prayers of the sincere heart are acceptable to God. Jesus' advice as recorded in Matthew's gospel brings to mind a novel by the Russian writer Anton Chekov, which relates how two thieves attack and kill a street beggar and proceed to tear his garments to distribute amongst themselves. In one of the inner pockets of the suit, one thief finds a piece of bacon. He proceeds to have his first bite, when the other thief, suddenly angered, says, "Aren't you ashamed of yourself? Today is Friday, a day of fasting!" His friend looks at him in astonishment but stops eating the bacon, and the two leave the forest without breaking their fast.

The story points out, in a comic way, that fasting by itself has no meaning if you are disobedient or (like the thieves) committing crimes. Fasting during Lent needs to be done in the context of deep reflection on the truth about ourselves, in a spirit of unusual sincerity and honesty. Fasting is, in fact, a companion to prayer: one more way we speak to God from the heart.

The true understanding of Lent rests on a sturdy tripod of prayer, abstinence, and charity. Lent reminds us that man is always confronted with choices—choices that lead us to two paths in life. The first path is one of darkness, evil and sin. The second is that of light, God, righteousness, and goodness. At the juncture of these two paths stands the fortress of prayer, abstinence, and charity, which leads mankind forward to seek perfection. This is the purpose of Great Lent in the Armenian Church.

The Armenian Apostolic Church has ruled on the traditions of Lent by creating canons based on the thought of the apostles. Apostolic Canon number eight reads: "The Apostles ordered and affirmed that the 40 days be set aside as days of abstinence from evil-doing, from sin and from food, preceding [the day] of the passion of our Savior.

The oldest Armenian Lenten traditions hardly allowed for the consumption of any food at all. Indeed, the Armenian Church sometimes refers to Lent as Aghouhatzk, meaning "salt and bread," because at one time these elements were the only permitted foods. Over time, Lenten rules have changed to allow any food that does not derive from animals (meat and milk, e.g.). Alcoholic beverages were also forbidden. These rules were based on the Biblical principle that many human vices proceed from eating and drinking.

## **Parish Council Update**

As announced in the recent Church email, Fr. Krikor will celebrate his assignment's first Badarak at St. Vartan Armenian Church on Sunday, March 8.


#### Thank You to our interim priest

## Biography of Fr. Krikor Zakaryan New Priest of St. Vartan Armenian Church

Rev. Fr. Krikor Zakaryan was born on November 29, 1977, in Plovdiv, Bulgaria. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuk and Elena Zakaryan. Fr. Zakaryan received his primary education at the "Dimitar Blagoev" school in Plovdiv. He continued his education at the "Victoria and Krikor Tutundjyan" Armenian school in Plovdiv and graduated in 1992.

In Plovdiv's "Knyaz Alexander Battenberg" secondary school, Fr. Krikor Zakaryan studied biology, humanitarianism and French. He graduated in 1995. As

one of the finest students of the French language, Fr. Zakaryan was selected to travel to France on an educational tour.

From 1997 to 1999, he served in the Bulgarian army. Because of his exemplary service, Fr. Zakaryan was promoted within the ranks of the army.

In 2003, he was admitted to the "Alex and Marie Manoogian Seminary" of the Armenian Patriarchate in Jerusalem. His dedication to the seminary and his high marks earned Fr. Zakaryan numerous awards. He graduated from the seminary with excellence in 2007.

Fr. Krikor Zakaryan received his Fourth-Degree Acolyte of the Armenian Holy Apostolic Church from His Beatitude Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, the Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem and was ordained to the Diaconate by His Eminence Archbishop Nourhan Manoukian. With his strong vocal abilities, Fr. Zakaryan received vocal training from Mr. Setrak Erganyan, a well-known composer. Fr. Zakaryan often sang as the soloist in the choir. Fr. Zakaryan has written spiritual/religious articles which have been published in Bulgaria and in Jerusalem.

On August 5, 2007, Fr. Krikor Zakaryan married Miss Anoush Yazadzhiyan in Bulgaria. They are blessed with two daughters.

In 2008, he was invited as a Priesthood-Candidate by His Eminence, Archbishop Hovnan Derderian, Primate of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America. On August 10, 2008, he was ordained to the Diaconate by the Primate in the La Canada Armenian Church.

Fr. Zakaryan served at St. Vartan Armenian Church in Oakland, California, prior to his appointment as the Deacon-In-Charge of the Armenian Church of the Desert in Rancho Mirage, California.

Rev. Fr. Krikor Zakaryan was ordained and consecrated to the Priesthood on October 13, 2009 by His Eminence, Archbishop Hovnan Derderian, Primate of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America. The Rev. Fr. Krikor Zakaryan celebrated his first Divine Liturgy on Sunday, November 8, 2009 at the social hall of the Armenian Church of the Desert in Rancho Mirage.

During his pastorate, the sanctuary of St. Garabed's was built and completed. The Consecration of the Sanctuary took place on Sunday, January 7, 2012. On April 26, 2013 the Altar of St. Garabed was consecrated, both by His Eminence Archbishop Hovnan Derderian.

The Rev. Fr. Krikor Zakaryan completed his Masters Degree in Theology (Major – "Ministry, Leadership and Service") in 2014 at Claremont School of Theology, Claremont, CA. Fr. Zakaryan also completed a Youth Ministry Certificate program at Fuller Seminary, Pasadena, CA in 2017. At the present time Fr. Zakaryan is also involved as a Religious Advisor for the Diocesan Christian Education Council (CEC), Camp Committee and Camp Board, serving the youth (ages 0 to 17) on a diocesan level.

Rev. Fr. Krikor Zakaryan served as the Parish Priest of St. Garabed Armenian Apostolic Church of the Desert from 2009 through February 2020.

His first Sunday celebrating Badarak at St. Vartan Armenian Church will be March 8, 2020.
